Refugee women from Soroti



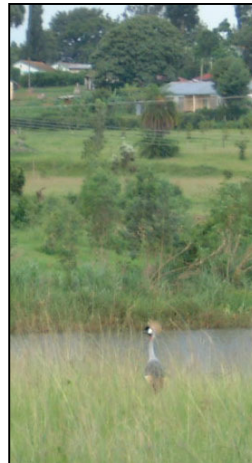
They came here 6 years ago, moved by UNICEF.
